Overview of NY Rising Community Reconstruction Program (NYRCR)

NYRCR Program

- Empowers localities severely damaged by Superstorm Sandy, Hurricane Irene, and Tropical Storm Lee to “build back better”
- Culminates in a community-driven recovery plan for Clarkstown that:
 - Considers current damage, future threats, and economic opportunities
 - Identifies resilient and innovative reconstruction projects



Funding

- Community Development Block Grant–Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR)
 - \$4.4 billion throughout NY State
 - \$664 million to NYRCR Program
 - \$3 million of NYRCR funds to Clarkstown
- Funds used for recovery efforts involving
 - Community Planning and Capacity Building
 - Housing
 - Economic Development
 - Infrastructure Systems
 - Health and Social Services
 - Natural and Cultural Resources



Overview of the Process

- Establish vision and goals
- Identify assets, needs and opportunities
- Develop strategies to reduce risks to assets
- Formulate projects with a focus on CDBG-DR funding
- Prepare cost estimates and risk assessment
- Draft final reconstruction plan



Role of the Planning Committee

- The Planning Committee
 - Recommends websites and social media for promoting community engagement events
 - Provides contacts at venues for committee meetings and public engagement events
 - Assists with distributing posters and handouts for public engagement events
 - Provides photographs during and after storm events depicting flooding and resultant damage



Role of the Community

- 10 Planning Committee Meetings
- 4 Public Engagement Events
 - Community input on vision, geographic scope, and community asset maps
 - Community input on needs and opportunities, strategies, and projects and actions
 - Community input on proposed projects
 - Share Final Plan and next steps



Geographic Scope

- Area where assets are most at risk
- Area in which future construction, reconstruction or natural area restoration should be encouraged



Storm Damage and Critical Issues



- Identify areas that were damaged during past storms
- Identify areas that are vulnerable to future storm damage
- Identify areas that are critical to protect from storm damage
- **ASSIGNMENT:** Provide descriptions and photos of storm damage

- Identify Clarkstown's critical issues
 - Are there issues with preparedness
 - Are there issues with response
 - Are there issues with vulnerability of key assets and/or services
- **ASSIGNMENT:** Further identify Critical Issues
- Planning Firm will review regional and local plans
